Nakanawa Fund Special Project: Security Enhancements coming to Nakanawa

Nakanawa helps us find our way in different stages of our lives, as the founder so simply and eloquently said. The sense of safety, privacy and youthful companionship, a place apart, is dear to us all. Yet the world has come to us in this era of online maps, wireless media and intrusions on privacy. Thus we come to you on the supremely important topic of Camp security and safety.

This fall, Karen and the board engaged outside security consultants for a current assessment of our security and safety measures. Their final recommendation is a phased approach to upgrade and enhance security, communications, training and preparation for our summer session.

Please contribute to this special project of the Nakanawa Fund. Our goal is to raise 100k by May.

That will provide:

- Installed Security Gates with Controlled Access; each gate is \$35,000 to
- Increased No-trespassing Signage along Camp's borders \$500;
- Strategically Placed Cameras \$3500; Closed Radio System \$20,000;
- Staff Safety and Security Training with Printed Manuals \$2500.





A Legacy Revisited: Ron Witt's Visit to Lake Aloaloa

This month, Camp welcomed a rare visitor: Ron Witt, the great-nephew of William Cooper, the visionary behind the creation of our lake. Cooper had plans for a grand fishing camp development on the Cumberland Plateau but died tragically in 1913 while attempting to save the dam during a cold, heavy rainstorm. The all-night effort led to pneumonia which ultimately claimed his life. Cooper is buried under a large tree in the cemetery near the camp entrance.

Ron shared that Cooper and his business partner had agreed that the surviving friend would plant an oak tree in memory of their bond, and he expressed his excitement to see the tree still standing today. Ron also revealed that Cooper was one of the region's largest landowners, but his heir squandered the fortune by 1919, allowing Colonel Rice to purchase the property. It was a privilege to share Ron's enthusiasm as he connected with his great-uncle's enduring legacy, including Lake Aloaloa, the dam, and Cooper's Stand, the shelter which honors his name.

help prep camp for the summer season. No special skills required - just a willingness to pitch in alongside other Nakanawa volunteers.


