

My husband teases me because I don't talk much about my sorority, either of my colleges, or my high school. But when Nakanawa is mentioned, I sing the songs, cheer the cheers, and get very "rah rah!" As it turns out, Nakanawa is an organization I have remained loyal to for most of my life.

As a little girl, I knew how important Nakanawa was to my family. I was told of the years my great-grandmother, Margaretta Graham, attended Camp. She started the Amazon team, helped create both tie styles and colors still worn today by Amazons and Valkyries, and was the pillar of her community both at home and in the history book of Camp.

My grandmother, Jane Beavers, was also a camper, followed by my mother, Margaretta Moore, my sister, Maddie Bourgeois, and myself.

It has brought me great joy to share Camp with my three daughters. Having that connection outside of our home forms a stronger bond between us. My girls have fallen in love with Camp and view it as a priority over all other summer activities.
